**Sunday, November 2nd, 2025**  
***ALL SOULS DAY***

Today the Catholic Church pauses her ordinary rhythm to remember all the faithful departed—those who have gone before us, marked with the sign of faith. On All Saints Day we sought the intercession of all the Saints in Heaven. On this day we pray for those still being purified. We pray with hope, as the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC 958) says, "Our prayer for them is capable not only of helping them, but also for making their intercession for us effective."

Wisdom 3:1 "But the souls of the righteous are in the hands of God, and no torment will ever touch them." This is the heart of Christian hope- that death is not annihilation but transformation. Romans 6:5 "If we have been united with Christ in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his." CCC 1006-1014 reminds us that death is "the end of man's earthly pilgrimage," yet for the believer it is also the "doorway to eternal life."

CCC 1030-1032 teaches "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven." This is not a punishment, but a loving purification- the souls' final preparation to "see God face to face" (1 Cor 23:12.)

St. Augustine wrote: "some suffer temporal punishments only in this life, others after death; still others both here and there." (City of God XXI. 13.) The Church traces the ancient practice of offering Mass Intentions for the Dead back to the earliest centuries. Church has always prayed 'Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord.' Why? Because our love continues beyond the grave.

In the creed, we profess our faith in the "Communion of saints." It is the communion of the Church Triumphant in Heaven, the Church Suffering in Purgatory and the Church Militant Church here on earth. CCC 954-959 "The union of the wayfarers with the brethren who sleep in the peace of Christ is in no way interrupted.... it is reinforced by an exchange of spiritual goods." We remain united through Prayer, Sacrifice and Love. Just as we ask the Saints to pray for us, so we pray

for our departed loved ones. Love does not end with death; it only changes its expression.

All Souls' Day is not only about remembering the dead, but also about reforming our own lives. To live wisely, we must live with 'Eternity' in mind-forgiving readily, loving generously and detaching ourselves from sin. ST. John Chrysostom once said: "Let us help and commemorate them. If Job's sons were purified by their father's sacrifice, why should we doubt that our offerings for the dead bring them some consolation?"

We can help them through:

- 1) The Holy Mass Intentions- the most perfect prayer of intercession.
- 2) Indulgences- the Church grants plenary indulgence for visiting cemeteries and praying for the dead (November 1 - 8).
- 3) Personal prayer, Rosary, and acts of Charity offered for their repose.

The world sees cemeteries as places of sorrow; the Church sees them as gardens of hope. Each grave is a seed waiting for resurrection. "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, though he dies, yet shall he live." (Jn 11:25.) So today, as we pray for our beloved dead - parents, grandparents, friends, forgotten/ orphaned souls, we entrust them to the mercy of God. Let us also renew our faith that we too shall see them again, in that eternal communion where there is no more death, no tears, no separation - only the endless light of Christ.



# GREGORIAN MASS FOR THE DECEASED



Gregorian Masses are a series of 30 Holy Masses traditionally offered on 30 consecutive days, for one individual soul. The custom of offering Gregorian Masses for a particular individual soul recognizes that few people are immediately ready for heaven after death, and that, through the infinite intercessory power of Christ's sacrifice, made present in the Holy Mass, a soul can be continually perfected in grace and enabled to enter finally, into the union with the most Holy Trinity our God, in heaven.

Gregorian Masses take their name from St. Gregory the Great who was the Pope from 590 to 604. Pope Gregory himself recorded an event in his Fourth Book Of Dialogues as follows. A monk in the monastery of Saint Andrew in Rome, named Justus, confessed on his deathbed to hiding three gold coins. This was violation of vow of poverty. As a severe lesson, pope Gregory forbade the other monks from visiting Justus's deathbed and ordered him to be buried in the monastery's garbage dump along with the money. However, pope Gregory later took pity on the monk's soul and ordered that Masses be offered for him for 30 consecutive days. At the end of the 30th Mass, the deceased appeared to one of his fellow monks and announced that he had been delivered from the flames of purgatory. From this incident the tradition of Gregorian Mass was begun.

## WHY DO WE OFFER MASS INTENTIONS FOR THE DEAD?

The ancient Jewish people believed in the efficacy of prayers and sacrifices offered for the deceased. 2 Maccabees 12:46 "It is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from sins." 12:43 "He (Judas, the Army Captain) send twelve thousand drachms of silver to Jerusalem for sacrifice to be offered for the sins of the dead."

Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us that when we offer a Mass Intention for the deceased we are not merely "remembering" them - we are uniting their souls to the supreme sacrifice of Christ on the cross. CCC 1367 "The sacrifice of Christ and the sacrifice of the Eucharist (Holy Mass) are one single sacrifice." We all could be enjoying the goodness of the hard work of our ancestors. By offering Mass Intentions, we continue to exercise charity toward our departed brothers, sisters and ancestors aiding their purification and hastening their entrance into heaven.

No prayer or act of devotion equals the value of the Holy Mass. When we offer a Mass Intention for someone who has died, we are giving them the most perfect gift possible - the presence and merits of Christ Himself. Saint Jerome said: "The souls of the departed are relieved by the prayers of the Holy Church and by the sacrifice of the Holy Mass." Saint Monica, before her death, told her son Saint Augustine: "Lay this body anywhere, only this I beg of you, that you remember me at the Altar of the Lord." Thus, we see that, offering the Mass Intentions for the deceased had been a practice of the very ancient Church. Pope Benedict XVI once said, "When we pray for the dead in the Eucharistic celebration, we ask that they may be purified by the love of God and be admitted to the eternal banquet of heaven."

You are welcome to offer the Mass Intentions for the deceased in the Office.

You can do it online also. All those names could be kept on the Altar throughout the month of November.
